

County and parts of Noble, Pawnee and Lincoln counties, with a combined population of approximately 82,000.

Grant funds classroom renovations for ECU Social Work department

East Central University's Social Work program has received a grant from the Child Welfare Professional Enhancement Program (CWPEP) for the second time in the past three years and will use the funds to develop an inspiring learning space.

The ECU Social Work program will use the \$40,000 grant to transform an out-of-date classroom in the Horace Mann building into an inviting, interactive classroom.

ECU professor, students to study at ancient site

Her first name may not be Indiana, but – just like the beloved Hollywood character - East Central University's own Dr. Jones always has her sights on new discoveries.

Dr. Holly Jones, a professional archaeologist for 25 years, will lead ECU's first-ever field school early this summer at an undisclosed dig site in Oklahoma. The archeology field school will last three weeks and participants will earn three credit hours. The course will be limited to 12 students.

Jones, who teaches in ECU's Native American Studies program, said the site could be home to a Native American earthlodge village as much as 3,000 years old. She hypothesizes the site may be pre-contact Caddoan, meaning it existed in the Caddoan culture before European contact.

Jones said the course isn't just about digging for new discoveries. Students will gain valuable flotation practice on site, as well as have the opportunity to practice archaeological lab work such as the cleaning and cataloging of discovered artifacts.

There are no pre-requisites for the course, Jones said. ECU's Native American Studies program does offer a specialized bachelor's degree in Cultural Resource Management. Read more at www.ecok.edu/news.

Meyers earns ASCAP Award

East Central University music professor Dr. Nicholaus Meyers has been awarded the prestigious ASCAP Plus Award to honor his compositional works.

Meyers was honored by the American Society of Composers, Authors & Publishers for his entire body of published compositions, which numbers near 60.

ASCAP members who received less than \$25,000 in domestic performance royalties in the previous calendar year are eligible for the award, which focuses on members who compose children's music, concert music, jazz and musical theatre with a value far beyond the scope of performance surveys.

For the past 20 years, Meyers has composed music primarily for high school, college and church performances – intricate compositions intended for smaller venues. All of his works are 100 percent original, and not arrangements of other artists' works.

Meyers directs ECU's Pride of Tigerland marching band, wind ensemble, concert band and percussion ensemble.

The visiting artists behind "Lawn Games and Other Domestic Hazards" are Leticia Baiuvo and Steven Lemke. They consider the desire for domestic


security as a foundational reference point for their investigations of traditional house forms and yardscapes to include questions of indoor and outdoor living, home ownership and land use.


