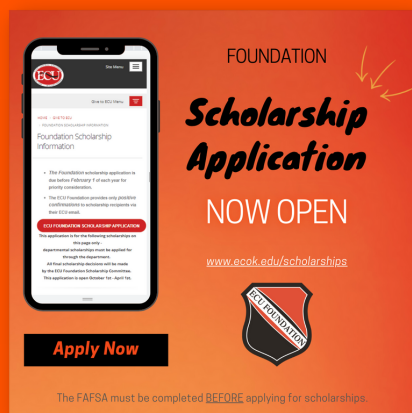

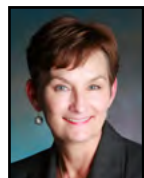
Pierson's Perceptions

So about that challenge. With ECU Homecoming, both idioms ring true: what you see is what you get and there is definitely more going on than meets the eye – and Tigers, it is all good.

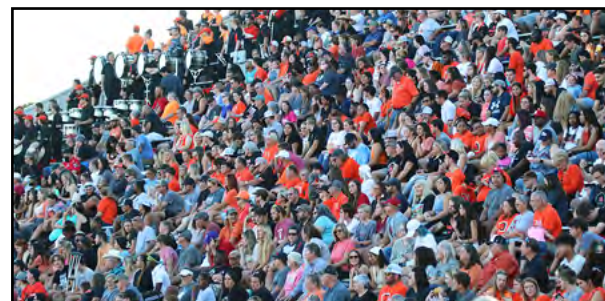
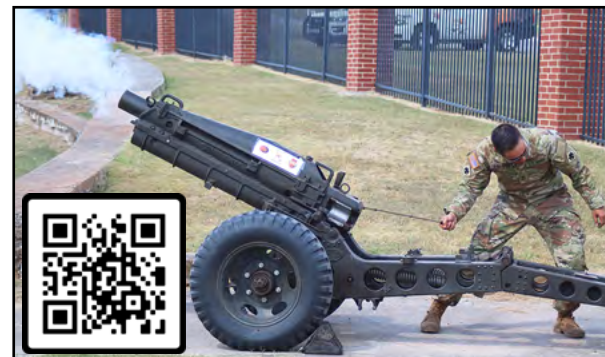
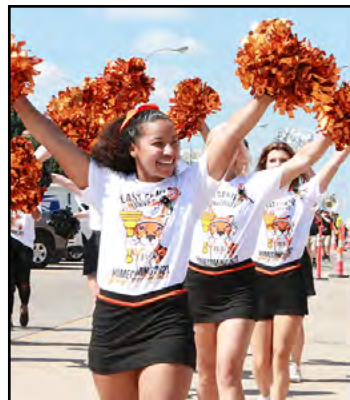

ECU English professor Dr. Ken Hada published ninth collection of poetry

Dr. Ken Hada, an English professor at ECU, has just published his ninth collection of original poetry titled *Contour Feathers*. Hada is a well-known and award-winning poet and five of his previous eight poetry collections were selected as finalists for an Oklahoma Book Award, an honor determined by the state's Department of Libraries. *Contour Feathers* continues in the vein of some of his earlier work in that the "voice" in the poems is seeking order and/or wisdom from the natural world. Hada is a tenured professor in the English and Languages department and has taught at ECU since 2000. He is the founder and director of the Scissortail Creative Writing Festival, a popular event that brings authors and poets from around the country to the ECU campus each spring.



ECU professor Dr. Jacintha Webster named Legal Studies pre-law advisor

ECU has named Dr. Jacintha Webster as its new pre-law advisor, effective immediately. The pre-law advisor assists students in navigating the law school application process. Webster, who is an assistant professor of Legal Studies at ECU, replaces Dr. Christine Pappas in the role. Pappas, who is chair of ECU's Politics, Law and Society department, had served as pre-law advisor since 2005. Webster graduated from the University of Oklahoma with a Political Science degree in 2012 and from Oklahoma City University with a Juris Doctorate in 2016. She has also served as a staff attorney for Oklahoma Indian Legal Services (OILS) and the Oklahoma House of Representatives. She specializes in Indian Law and is chair of that section of the Oklahoma Bar Association.

ECU alum returns to deliver 2021 Rothbaum Lecture

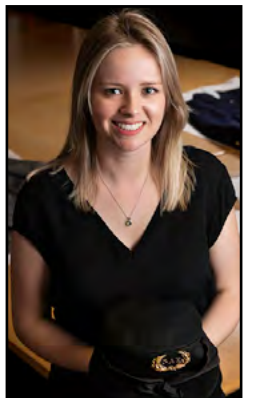
Accomplished History professor and ECU alumna Dr. Shae Smith Cox returned to campus September 20 to deliver the annual Rothbaum Lecture.

Cox is an assistant professor of History at Nicholls State University in Thibodaux, Louisiana, where she teaches courses on Women's History, Southern History and the U.S. Civil War.

The topic of her lecture at ECU was "When Women Vote: Struggles and Triumphs of the 19th Amendment."

Cox earned her Ph.D. in American History from the University of Nevada, Las Vegas in May 2020, with a minor in Public History. She specializes in 19th century race and gender with an emphasis on material culture and memory of the U.S. Civil War and Reconstruction.

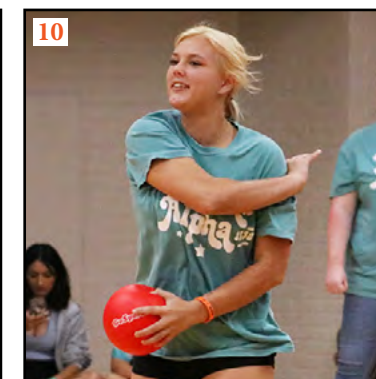
